From the Pastor's Desk...

Mount Calvary Family & Friends,

January in the Church is the season of Epiphany; this year the season extends through February. It's the time of year we hear readings sharing with us how Jesus *showed forth* HIS identity as God the Son. It is also the time of year we are reminded of our responsibility as God's People to *show forth* in our lives and conversations that Jesus is God's Son, our Savior. That's the essence of evangelism, *showing Jesus to and sharing Jesus with* the other people whose lives intersect with ours in ways great or small. Our Camp Restore Ministry and the different roles we play in the ministry *show* our Detroit neighbors the love of Jesus at work in our hearts and lives. As we share the story of Jesus' ministry and its impact on our lives, together with HIS promise to share God's forgiving grace with them as well, we *share* the love of Jesus at work in our hearts and lives. That is the essence of "Evangelism," the "Outreach" ministry of the Church.

We have a Board of Christian Outreach at Mount Calvary to lead our efforts as a congregation, but the responsibility to share God's gracious gifts with others lies with all of us. Matthew 28:19-20 is often referred to as "The Great Commission" . . . "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, 20 teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." . . . We are "commissioned" by Jesus to go in HIS Name with the message of grace and peace in HIS Name. It can be an awesome and fearful responsibility, thus it is great comfort to hear Jesus' promise to "be with [us] always!" It can also be an awesome and amazing experience when we see God touch someone else's life with HIS love and hope in Christ Jesus.

Elizabeth and I are currently working with Debbie Ellinger on a project to reach out to the prostitutes in our neighborhood. We also have a young Baptist pastor, Malcolm Griswold, interested in working with us on the project. Pastor Griswold is actually the one who brought the idea to us originally. We hope to begin in the next few weeks. The Council approved our general plan at its last meeting, only requesting that we move it from our intended Thursday evening plan to Saturday afternoons when there are not generally campers in the building. Members of the Council were generally excited at the prospect of this new outreach effort, but at the same time concerned for the safety of all involved. My own first

reaction was that I really didn't know what to do or how to begin . . . and my plate was already pretty full . . . which is why the first call I made was to Debra Ellinger. Some of you know Debbie from her work with "Gifts For All God's Children". Debbie has stepped out to begin a ministry to assist trafficked young women who want off the streets and make a new beginning through her "Ellie's House Ministry".

Our plan is to offer a meal, give participants an opportunity to share the struggles in their lives, and introduce the young ladies to God and HIS grace in Christ Jesus. Debbie and her group, and potentially Pastor Griswold, will lead the Bible Study and discussion portions of each meeting. Elizabeth and I will arrange the meal. We are anticipating small groups, probably 3-5 initially and growing to perhaps 10. We anticipate assistance from the Neighborhood Policing Officers (Officer Wade & Company) from the 9th Precinct to provide security for both the young ladies and program leaders, and anyone else in the building. Debbie and her group will also employ the monitoring practices they regularly use to ensure that participants are not free to roam the building and are monitored during their participation in the events.

While I know most of us are already stretching our limits to assist with the needs and opportunities presented by the ministries of Mount Calvary and Camp Restore Detroit, I still should offer: If you would like to help with our new outreach endeavor, or just to learn more about the ministry, please speak to me or to Elizabeth Parrish.

How amazing do you find the many different doors God is opening for us to share HIS Love? I think, "There is no way we can do it all!" Then I remember the words of Saint Paul, "I can do all things through God who strengthens me!" (Philippians 4:13). These ministries God has entrusted to us may be challenges for which you and I indeed are not capable, but as we have seen in all we have accomplished so far, when we find our sufficiency in Christ Jesus HE opens doors and makes a way . . . often that way is opened by surrounding us with brothers and sisters in the Body of Christ from other places. When we are looking for a way, it is good to remember that Jesus is always, "The Way, the Truth, and the Life!" (John 14:6)

God bless you as you serve Jesus in all you say and in all you do!

WORSHIP NOTES FOR FEBRUARY

During the month of February, the common theme taken from the readings is the love coming from Christ. As the hymn writer, Stuempfle, Jr., so adequately penned in hymn 535 in the Lutheran Service Book, the love of Christ reaches in width, length, height, and depth. It's to the point that no one could possibly dream. Consider its width--it covers everyone, from all times and places. Consider its length--it can and will endure through tough times and also through eternity. Consider its height--it covers the noblest ideas and resounds in heaven. And finally consider its depth--it covers Christ's death on the cross. As Paul wrote in I Corinthians 13, it will outlast faith and hope.

4th SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY February 3

The opening Old Testament Reading sends comfort to all when Jeremiah reveals that God knew us and loved us before the creation of the world! Jesus, in His ministry, showed us His love, as He healed many people of their illnesses and diseases. Finally, Paul wrote that the greatest gifts of speech, money, sacrifice, and human endeavor are worthless unless they are done with the love of Christ. Hymns that carry the love of Christ in our lives include "Love in Christ Is Strong and Living"; "Where Charity and Love Prevail"; "Not for Tongues of Heaven's Angels"; and "How Wide the Love of Christ."

5th SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY February 10

The love of Christ radiates inside His followers and moves them to ministry. Isaiah saw the angels, was touched by a hot coal to be purified, and then exclaimed, "Here am I, send me!" Jesus called His disciples to become "fishers of men." Paul wrote that spiritual gifts given to believers must edify fellow believers so that their faith will be strengthened. Hymns that fortify this message include "Faithful Trees, the Spirit's Sowing"; "O Christ, Who Called the Twelve"; "Come, Follow Me', the Savior Spake"; and "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Crying."

6th SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY February 17

Love from Christ will give us the strength to withstand tough timespersecution, hatred, poverty, etc. Jesus tells us to rejoice because the kingdom of God will be ours. While on earth, we need to be like trees; they are planted firmly and can withstand the worst weather. Finally, we can rejoice because our bodies will be resurrected on the last day and we will be with Christ. Hymns for this Sunday include "Songs of Thankfulness and Praise"; "The Man Is Ever Blessed"; and "We Know that Christ Is Raised."

7th SUNDAY AFTER THE EPIPHANY February 24

God's love moves us to forgive others. This includes both family members and our enemies. In the Old Testament Reading, Joseph revealed himself to his brothers, saying that it was God's purpose to bring them to Egypt so that they could be fed during the time of extreme famine. Although the brothers had sold him into slavery, God helped Joseph to forgive them of their past deed, thus preserving the family. In the Gospel Reading, Jesus tells us to love and do good to our enemies and that our reward will be in heaven. Hymns for this Sunday include "O Splendor of God's Glory Bright"; "Praise to You and Adoration"; "Hail, O Source of Every Blessing"; and "Blest Are They."
